Let's Talk Christmas (and Advent)

"The war on Christmas" is something that we have heard of for the past decade or two, and while I am often one to roll my eyes at the accusations that Starbucks or Target have some big nefarious plans to overthrow the second holiest day of the year (Easter is #1 for Christians), I will say that American Christmas has definitely become a separate holiday from the Christian Holiday we celebrate as Christians. While I do think this shift has been part of our culture's focus on consumerism and profit margins, I do not see any one business or organization to blame. Rather, I think it is part of the continued growth of the fastest growing religion in America – Materialism.

Years ago, we celebrated Christmas with our blend of European non-Christian traditions that were folded into the celebration of Christ's birth. The Church, rather than ruling out the local pagan celebrations, repurposed the traditions to make them their own – this is why we still celebrate Christmas around a decorated evergreen tree and celebrate the holiday less than a week after the winter solstice. These were ways that our Christian tradition tried to honor the heart of traditions that mattered to communities while still focusing on Christ as the central figure of the holiday.

However, in the past hundred years or so, Christmas has taken an entirely new turn, and that is one where Christ is no longer the center, and a jolly arctic Caucasian reverse-burglar in red has become the central figure of this celebration of material. About a century ago, Coca-Cola advertised Santa in their traditional Coca-Cola red, and ever since that moment, Santa Claus's appearance and outfit have been cemented in our American zeitgeist. There is nothing inherently bad about Santa, he is based off of one of the earliest Church Fathers that was known for his charity to children (and also hitting a heretic in the face at a major Church Council meeting). However, the man in red today that we see seems to be more concerned with the quantity of gifts rather than the reason why we exchange them in the firstplace – because we as Lutheran Christians believe that the arrival of God, Jesus Christ's birth, is the greatest gift the world has received.

Growing up in the 1980s and 1990s, American Christmas had become entirely conflated with Christian Christmas, and as time went on, American Christmas overshadowed the Christian celebration more and more. So this December, I would like to invite you to celebrate Advent and Christmas in a new, or dare I say, more traditional way.

- 1. While we may need the lights and joy to endure the darkest nights of the year (seasonal depression is real y'all!), let us remember that Christmas does not actually begin until December 25th, which according to the ancient tradition starts at sun down on Dec. 24, and it lasts twelve full days until January 5th (with Epiphany, the arrival of the Magi, being January 6th). This does not mean that we need to be confrontational or combative about the difference in celebrations, but I think there is a benefit to waiting until the day itself rather than continually bumping the celebrations beginning earlier and earlier (how soon until the Christmas season starts to supplant Halloween).
- 2. **Take the time to celebrate Advent!** Advent marks the beginning of the Christian New Year, and it is a season of preparation as we await Christ's arrival. The Christian season leading up to Christmas is an entire season about anticipation, of awaiting something that has not yet come. Rather than rushing past this season of arrival and anticipation, let us slow down and take the time to appreciate the slow building crescendo that takes place during Advent. This Advent Cross of Grace will be meeting for weekly worship every Wednesday at 7pm at St. Timothy's-in-the-Valley.
- 3. **Ponder the Incarnation** One of the most incredible mysteries of the Christian tradition is the Incarnation, God entering into this world. The mystery of Christ's arrival and the two natures of God (Fully God and Fully Human), are a wealth of understanding that Christians would do well to study. Some years ago, I was introduced to St. Athanasius' seminal work On the Incarnation(https://tinyurl.com/TheIncarnation). This brief, but incredibly rich theology book is perhaps Christianity's greatest piece of literature pondering the details of what it means for God to enter into this broken world we live in. This Advent, I'd invite you to join us for our **9am Saturday morning study at Panera in Teays Valley on Dec. 2, 9, 16, and 23rd, as we will be reading On the Incarnation with one another.** You are welcome to read it on your own, but given the depth of the theology, I think it will be fruitful for us to read parts of it together in person and reflect on it, much like we do with Bible Study during Sunday School.
- 4. In Addition to Charity, also Seek Justice Christmas is a time when the outpouring of charity is incredible! I can honestly say that Christmastime (both American and Christian), is one of incredible charity gifts that have a profound impact on individuals and families. However, we as Christians are also called to be part of greater solutions to systemic problems too. While these problems may seem insurmountable at times, we would be wise to consider the words of St. Dietrich Bonhoeffer (he's a saint in my book): "We are not to simply bandage the wounds of victims beneath the wheels of injustice, we are to drive a spoke into the wheel itself." Recently we have seen a rise in both anti-Jewish and anti-Muslim rhetoric due to the War in Gaza, and we have also recently seen an entire community in Charleston, Charleston's largest, most diverse, and also the poorest community, be deprived of water, gas, and pertinent information. This Advent and Christmas, let us take the time to pray for and ponder ways that we as a small Church in Teays Valley can have an impact on bigger issues of injustice. While we may not be able to have an

immediate impact here and now on these issues, by taking the time to pray and ponder, we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit's guidance, and we may discern future ministries of Cross of Grace in the process.

Christmas has always been a time of great joy for me, but I can honestly say that over the years, the American celebration has overtaken and obscured the heart of this holy seasons, at least for me it has, and I'd urge you as Christians to take the time to celebrate the heart of this holy time together. Because as long as we seek out Christ and seek to be more like Christ, God will be glorified this American Christmas, Advent, and all twelve days of Christmas.

If you would like to provide food for the meal, money to assist in purchasing food for the meal or to help with this awesome ministry, please reach out to Susan Santrock.


Last month we were able to provide a meal to 25 men who are currently in recovery thanks to the generosity of our amazing congregation!




Due to the busy upcoming season of Advent and Christmas, we will be not have a Movie Night in December!
